



3. Attend and enjoy the event! For in-person events, remember a water bottle, good walking shoes and perhaps a jacket (for cooler days).



Grow Without a Garden



Grey-headed Coneflowers

Did you know?

The Grey-headed Coneflower is a native wildflower that is both beautiful and beneficial to pollinators and birds. It's one of the wildflowers that KLT collects seeds from each year from the tallgrass prairie at Ballyduff Trails. When picked and handled, the grey seedheads have a distinct scent some describe it as smelling like anise. black liquorice or even turpentine!

Spring Beauty and Blooms — Ephemerals Galore!

Spring is a special time in forests of the Kawarthas for many reasons. One of our favourite seasonal changes is the emergence of spring ephemeral flowers that delight onlookers with their delicate flowers and pops of colour on the forest floor.

Naturalists (PFN) lead us through the beautiful
forests of Tecasy Ranch, a KLT Partner in
Conservation. PFN's hike leaders will share
their love and extensive knowledge of local
flora while you enjoy the signs of spring.

Did you know?

Ants collect seeds of various species including Trilliums in a process known as "myrmechorry." The ants carry the seeds into their nests, which have perfect conditions for the Trillium seeds to stratify and germinate. The ants, in turn, will eat a fleshy structure on trillium seeds called an "elaiosome."

Birds for Everyone!

From warblers to woodpeckers and everything in between (at least in Ontario!), join us for a birding extravaganza where our team of facilitators will help you to learn about — and hopefully view — the many birds that call the Kawarthas home — at least for part of the year. Learn about migration patterns and which birds fly away only to return each year for the summer and fall. Bring along binoculars, if you have them, and a keen eye!

We offer our thanks to all of the volunteers, donors, and funders who made the protection of this 1,411-acre property possible. Thank you for protecting the land you love!


Skyworld: The Wonders of the Night Sky

Our Skyworld event is back to offer you the chance to look at the stars! This perennial favourite will be led by members of the Peterborough Astronomical Association (PAA), a group of amateur astronomers from Peterborough and the surrounding area. Following a presentation, you will have the opportunity to observe the setting up of a variety of different telescopes and then look skyward to view a diverse variety of astronomic objects including planets. star clusters, globular clusters, galaxies, double stars, and more. Learn about the equipment PAA members use and about the objects visible in the night sky. If the weather is rainy or too cloudy, registrants will be notified the event will be postponed to the rain date.

Annual Tallgrass and Wildflower Seed Harvest

An annual tradition! For more than a decade, volunteers have helped restore a local tallgrass prairie, one of the rarest ecosystems in North America. You can continue this tradition by helping collect the seeds of tallgrass plants and wildflowers on this beautiful property.

Land donor, Ralph McKim, has been managing the tallgrass prairie for almost two decades by germinating tallgrass plants like Little Bluestem, Big Bluestem, and Sideoats Grama in homemade greenhouses during the winter. The following year, the seeds, harvested with the help of volunteers like you, will be ready to be planted in the prairie!





Meet the Passport to Nature Facilitators

Sam Banton is a passionate lover of life and people. She writes poems as an artistic expression of self and comes alive with every opportunity to share her work through spoken word performances. Sam views sharing her work with others as a privilege to share her perspective and create space for honest and open conversations. Her artistic process involves drawing inspiration from her lived experiences and the experiences of those around her.

Jazz Barrick is a recent graduate of Fleming College's Ecosystem Management program. She has a passion for all things birds and plans to begin a career in avian conservation. Having just returned from Bruce Peninsula Bird Observatory where she was assisting with migration monitoring, she is ready to share her knowledge and identification skills with her community.

Lisa Browning is the Education Coordinator at Ontario Turtle Conservation Centre (OTCC). Lisa has a Bachelor of Science degree from Trent University in Biology and Environmental Science and an Ecosystem Management Technology diploma from Fleming College. While completing her undergraduate degree, Lisa was introduced to the world of turtles by volunteering at the OTCC as a cleaner. During her summers, she worked with Christina Davy's research lab, where she searched for turtles in wetlands and monitored the sky for bats. She joined the OTCC field team in 2020, to track Blanding's Turtles for the headstart program, and was lucky enough to work on the education program as well. During 2021, Lisa joined the Adopt-A-Pond program at the Toronto Zoo, where she monitored turtle and snake populations in the Rouge National Urban Park. Having returned to the OTCC in 2022 as Education Coordinator. Lisa feels very fortunate to have had amazing mentors along the way and is passionate about sharing her love for turtles with those she meets! ontarioturtle.ca

Sam Clapperton is the Land Research Coordinator at Kawartha Land Trust. She holds an Honours BSc in Environmental and Resource Science from Trent University and an advanced diploma from Fleming College in the Ecosystem Management program. Sam has experience working with conservation authorities, Parks Canada, and consulting firms to implement species at risk monitoring, ecosystem restoration and outreach. She is passionate about data-driven decision-making in conservation and believes strongly in the power of geographic information system (GIS) as a conservation tool. Outside of work, Sam enjoys developing her naturalist skills. She has a strong interest in lichens, herptiles and birds and can be found paddling wetlands and hiking forests accompanied with her binoculars, field guides, and dog in tow.

Joel Grandmont is a Project Biologist with D.M. Wills Associates Limited and holds an Honours BSc in Environmental and Resource Science from Trent University and an advanced diploma from Fleming College in the Ecosystem Management program. Joel's experiences as a consultant have led him to travel across most of Ontario, where he uses his impact assessment skills to prevent and mitigate the impacts of infrastructure on sensitive wildlife and species at risk. Outside of work, Joel can be found woodworking, backcountry camping, and pressing flowers.

Junaid Shahzad Khan is a Muslim-Canadian from the Indus Valley, from the region that is now Pakistan. Junaid has worked as an ecologist for over 12 years on issues of invasive species, plastic pollution, habitat revitalization, insect conservation, and bird education. Over the past four years, Junaid has committed himself to the understanding of ecologies within Indigenous cultures. Through the ongoing learning of Anishinaabemowin, and working alongside community members looking to rejuvenate Anishinaabek cultural practices, he hopes to help support efforts towards Indigenous land sovereignty across Turtle Island. creatorsgardenmarket.ca

Martha Lawrence is a graduate of Lakehead University's Ontario Master Naturalist Program and has attended numerous Lakehead nature workshops since. She is an active member of Peterborough Field Naturalists, Kawartha Field Naturalists and North Durham Nature. Martha also volunteers for the Robert L. Bowles Nature Centre in Ramara Township coordinating design and completion of three RLBNC workshop booklets to date including Winter Dendrology, World of Mushrooms & Flora of the Carden Alvar.

Jamie Morris is a retired teacher and longtime Lindsay resident. He is Chair of the team that successfully applied to Nature Canada to have City of Kawartha Lakes certified as a Bird-Friendly City and sits on the City's Environmental Advisory Committee. His "spark bird" (the bird that got him interested in birding) is the Bobolink, which he encountered on walks around Fleming's Frost Campus.

Lara Mrosovsky has been teaching and learning about growing food in small spaces since 2003. She is the author of *An Illustrated Guide to Growing Food on Your Balcony and Grow Without A Garden: 101 Plants for Containers*. For nine years she coordinated the first intensive green roof atop a community health centre in Ontario, where she established productive gardens and award-winning community programs. As a visual artist, Lara works in illustration and printmaking. Community engagement is central to both her gardening and her art practice.

Barb Rimmer is an avid hiker and certified hike leader from Hike Ontario. She leads hikes for the Ganaraska Hiking Trails Association and has hiked many trails, some being the Bruce Trails, Rideau Trails, and most of the Ganaraska Trails. Barb has been active in helping to improve the natural environment and always is seeking ways to make it better and more available for everyone. She has enjoyed volunteering for many years in many ways with the Kawartha Land Trust from leading hikes, assisting with trail maintenance and even counting bees on KLT's Big (Boyd/Chiminis) Island.

David Seymour has published two full-length books of poetry, *Inter Alia* (Brick Books), and *For Display Purposes Only* (Coach House Books), and a chapbook entitled *Head Arrangements* (Junction Books). Between 2011 and 2017 he served on the Goose Lane Editions editorial board as both an Acquisitions Editor and a Substantive Editor for the poetry books published under their Icehouse Poetry Imprint, and he continues to edit poetry manuscripts in a freelance capacity. In addition to writing and editing, David has also worked in the film and television industry as an Assistant Director and, after leaving the production floor, as the Director of Member Services for the Directors Guild of Canada. He currently resides in Lakehurst, Ontario.

Al Sippel graduated with a degree in biology from the University of Guelph 50 years ago this year. He spent 32 years with the Ministry of Natural Resources and since retiring has volunteered with Kawartha Land Trust for 10 years. Al has a number of interests including gardening, reading, and cooking. He met his wife, Margo Tant, while working on an ornithology project at university and they have both shared an avid interest in birding for over 40 years.

Lou Smyrlis has been exploring nature in the Kawarthas since moving to the area almost 30 years ago. He is the author of the Kawartha Wild column in the Lakefield Herald and the Peterborough Field Naturalist's Orchid newsletter. He also regularly posts his findings on Instagram (**@themanofthemarsh**) and has begun sharing his experiences with local groups.

Ben Stark is a graduate of Fleming College's Ecosystem Management program and he works to support groups around the Kawarthas that manage invasive species, maintain natural habitats, and spread awareness about ongoing biodiversity loss. He has been volunteering with Kawartha Land Trust since 2021. Ben enjoys hiking, birding, and identifying plants, and is on the planning committee for the Peterborough Monarch Festival.

Nancy Thomson, otherwise known as "Nature Nancy," is an engaging outdoor educator that has been teaching in the outdoor classroom for the last 25 years. Her sense of fun and genuine connection with the children creates a positive learning atmosphere. She values inquiry and exploration of our natural world through experiential learning and hands on activities. As a certified teacher, she has had incredible teaching opportunities in the past which have included Outdoor Education at Fleming College, teaching at several different Outdoor Centres, directing Summer Camps and teaching at Kawartha Pine Ridge District School Board and with ALIVE Outdoors.
